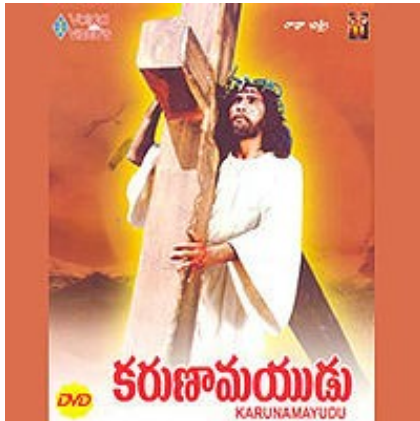

Do You See What I See? Film, Religion, and Theology in the History of an (East) Indian Jesus Movie

The study of film, religion, and theology has diversified considerably over the last two decades thanks to contributions from scholars representing a variety of academic disciplines and cultural contexts. Seldom, however, have the complexities of film and religion been explored from the perspective of a single movie's journey from production to reception. The history of *Karunamayudu* (1978), an (East) Indian movie of Jesus' life, serves as an important case study in the nuances of film's relationship to religion and theology.

Dwight H. Friesen recently completed his doctoral studies at New College, University of Edinburgh, where he probed the relationship between media, religion, and theology by studying the life of an (East) Indian Jesus film. This line of research is informed by his childhood in West Africa, studies in Christian theology, and several years of employ as a graphic designer. Currently he resides with his family in Calgary, AB.
